





Ada Byron Lovelace and the thinking machine by Laurie Wallmark (JfB L942w)

The boy who invented TV: the story of Philo Farnsworth by Kathleen Krull (JfB F237k)
Philo Farnsworth was a boy genius who came up with the idea for TV, successfully transmitted the first TV image and won a lawsuit against RCA when they tried to take credit for his invention.



Clara Barton: angel of the battlefield by the editors of *Time for Kids* (JB B285t)
Tells about the accomplishments of the famous nurse and founder of the American Red Cross.

The fantastic undersea life of Jacques Cousteau by Dan Yaccarino (JfB c834y)
Relates the life and passion of the well-known oceanographer.




Free at last! by Angela Bull (JB K585bu)

Learn about Jane Addams, who was the first American woman to win the Nobel Peace Prize when she helped her community by opening her house as a community center.




How Kate Warne saved President Lincoln: a story about the nation's first woman detective by Elizabeth Van Steenwyk (JB W241v)

Profiles one of America's first female architects who designed more than 800 buildings, including the magnificent Hearst Castle in San Simeon, CA.




Just behave, Pablo Picasso! by Jonah Winter (Jf 709.24 P581w)
Honors the modern artist master who rebelled against critics to paint the way he wanted to, not how others said he should.



Mrs. Harkness and the panda by Alicia Potter (Jf 599.789 P851m)
Recounts the story of a 1930s adventurer who brought the first panda to the United States.

My story, my dance: Robert Battle's journey to Alvin Ailey by Lesa Cline-Ransome (Jf792.82 B322c)
A boy discovers his passion for dance, overcomes a childhood disability and becomes the artistic director of a major dance theater.



A nation's hope: the story of boxing legend Joe Louis by Matt de la Pena (Jf 796.83 L929p)
A portrait of boxing legend Joe Louis that highlights his historic match against Germany's Max Schmeling on the eve of WWII.


Nurse, soldier spy: the story of Sarah Edmonds, a Civil War hero by Marissa Moss (JfB Ed57m)
Nineteen-year-old Sarah Edmonds disguised herself as a man to serve as a male nurse during the Civil War and later as a spy for the Union Army.



On a beam of light: a story of Albert Einstein by Jennifer Berne (JB Ei68be)
Looks at the life of the famous physicist from his first ideas to his groundbreaking theories.

Sonia Sotomayor: first Hispanic U.S. Supreme Court Justice by Lisa Tucker McElroy (JB So785m)
Relates the story of the first Hispanic person to serve on the United States Supreme Court.

The tree lady: the true story of how one tree-loving woman changed a city forever by H. Joseph Hopkins (JB Se72h)
A biography of Kate Sessions, a nature pioneer and activist, who brought trees and gardens to the desert region of San Diego. Her work can still be seen around the city today.



Viva Frida by Yuyi Morales (SP JE)
In English/Spanish bilingual text, provides a look at the famous artist's life through sparse text and brightly-colored, detailed photographs.

Who says women can't be doctors?: the story of Elizabeth Blackwell by Tanya Lee Stone (JfB B568w)
Blackwell was the first American female doctor. She refused to believe that women were too weak and not smart enough to be doctors.

W is for Webster: Noah Webster and his American dictionary by Tracey Fern (JB W395fe)
Noah Webster thought we needed an official national language, so he started the first American dictionary. He thought the job would take him five years. It took him twenty!



The Wright brothers by Ginger Wadsworth (JB W935w)
The story of the two brothers who invented and flew the first airplane in the early 20th century.
