


# HISTORICAL FICTION


*Chapter Books for Young Readers*



**Abby takes a stand** by *Pat McKissack*  
A grandmother tells her grandchildren the prejudice experienced by African-Americans prior to the Civil Rights Act.

**Away west** by *Patricia McKissack*

In 1879, a young African-American boy leaves the hardships of his family's Tennessee farm to journey west and start a new life in Kansas.



**Being Teddy Roosevelt** by *Claudia Mills*  
Riley does his fourth grade biography project on Teddy Roosevelt and learns about the president's determination, which inspires him to try to get music lessons and a saxophone.



**The boy who saved Cleveland: based on a true story** by *James Giblin*

When his family and neighbors become ill in the malaria epidemic in Cleveland, Ohio, in 1798, ten-year-old Seth helps to save them by grinding and carrying corn to provide nourishment.

**The courage of Sarah Noble** by *Alice Dalgliesh*

An eight-year-old girl travels with her father to the Connecticut wilderness in 1707 to build a log house for their family.



**Fire in the sky** by *Candice Ransom*  
Nine-year-old Stenny sneaks away to the naval air station near his home in New Jersey in 1937 where the Hindenburg is expected to land and witnesses the disastrous accident.

**Hannah** by *Gloria Whelan*

A nine-year-old blind girl living in 1887 has never been to school, but when the new teacher boards with her family she is finally able to attend and learn the Braille method.



**I'm sorry, Almira Ann** by *Jane Kurtz*  
Two best friends, Sarah and Almira, travel with their families in covered wagons from Missouri to Oregon on the Oregon Trail.

**Julie Meyer: the story of a wagon train girl**  
by *Dorothy Hoobler*

Julie and her family set out from Indiana to travel the Oregon Trail enduring many troubles along the way.



**Lincoln's Legacy** by *Stacia Deutsch*  
Four third-grade students use a video time travel gadget to travel back to 1862 to talk with President Abraham Lincoln about The Emancipation Proclamation. (Blast to the Past series)



**A Lion to Guard Us** by *Clyde Robert Bulla*  
In 1609, when their mother dies, Amanda and her younger brother and sister take a treacherous ocean voyage from London to try and find their father in Jamestown, Virginia.

**Meet Felicity: An American Girl** by *Valerie Tripp*

A young girl tells about her daily life in Colonial Williamsburg in 1774. (American Girls series)



**Next Spring an Oriole** by *Gloria Whelan*  
In 1837, Libby and her family move from Virginia to the frontier in Michigan where she makes a friend her own age.

**Pioneer Cat** by *William H. Hooks*

While traveling with her family on the Oregon Trail from Missouri, Kate finds a stray cat that helps her make a friend as she journeys to a new home.



**Pioneer Summer** by *Deborah Hopkinson*  
Charlie and his family move from Massachusetts to Kansas territory in the mid-nineteenth century where they try to adjust to a new lifestyle on the prairie. (Prairie Skies series)

**Rescue on the Outer Banks** by *Candice F. Ransom*

A young boy and his horse help an African-American rescue group to save the shipwrecked crew of the E.S. Newman in 1896.



**Sailing for Gold** by *Deborah Hopkinson*  
A young orphan boy stows away on a ship heading to Alaska at the time of the Klondike Gold Rush in 1897 with hopes of finding his uncle. (Klondike Kid series)

**Sky** by *Pamela Porter*

Georgia and her grandparents endure a major flood on the Blackfeet Indian Reservation in 1964 and find hope in a lost foal that survived the storm.



**The Snow Walker** by *Margaret K. Wetterer*  
During the east coast blizzard of 1888, a young boy becomes a hero by using his homemade snowshoes to help deliver medicine and food to his neighbors.



**Soft Rain: A Story of the Cherokee Trail of Tears** by *Cornelia Cornelissen*  
Nine-year-old Soft Rain tells of the forced move by the government of the Cherokee people from their North Carolina home to the west in 1838.

**Treasure in the Stream: The Story of a Gold Rush Girl**  
by *Dorothy Hoobler*

In 1848 when gold is discovered, ten-year-old Amy and her family are living on John Sutter's land in California, which leads to major changes in their lives.
